

Pierce County, Washington State and U.S. Unemployment Rates October 2006–2016




Pierce County's unemployment rate remained the same in October 2016, matching the revised September 2016 rate of 6.1 percent, above the year-ago estimate of 5.9 percent. The unemployment rate is below the highest October unemployment rate (9.5 percent in 2009) but remains higher than the lowest October unemployment rate (4.4 percent in 2006) experienced in the region over the last 10 years.



Government recorded the largest monthover employment gain of 1,400 jobs, 900 of which came from Local Government, while Educational & Health Services and Trade, Transportation & Utilities each added 700 jobs. Two industries (Natural Resources & Mining and Financial Activities) experienced no change, while six industries experienced month-over job losses. Leisure & Hospitality recorded the largest loss of 1,700 jobs, while Construction lost 600 jobs and Professional & Business Services lost 400 jobs. Other Services, Information and Manufacturing lost 100 jobs each.

From October 2015 to October 2016, eight industries experienced job growth. Trade, Transportation & Utilities had the greatest year-over gain, adding 4,700 jobs to the region. Educational & Health Services added 1,400 jobs and Construction contributed another 1,400. Government, Financial Activities, Professional & Business Services, Manufacturing and Other Services added a total of 1,800 jobs to the region. Two industries experienced year-over job losses: Leisure & Hospitality (down 1,000 jobs) and Information (down 300 jobs). Natural Resources & Mining was the only industry to remain unchanged.

Four industries that experienced monthover job losses still reported positive year-over gains: Manufacturing (200 jobs), Other Services (100 jobs), Professional & Business Services (200 jobs) and Construction (1,400 jobs). In addition, most industries in Pierce County continue to experience year-over employment gains. The county also recorded a year-over growth rate of 3.2 percent in civilian employment, below Washington State's growth rate of 3.8 percent for the second time in 2016.
