Welcome and Introductions

Dale King called the meeting to order and roundtable introductions were made.

Approval of Prior Meeting Notes

- Meeting notes accepted as prepared.
- Audra asked that the entire committee be looped in on any subsequent conversations for those unable to attend previous meetings.

Summer Jobs 253

Nick Bayard provided an update:

- Summer Jobs 253 is now a 5-year old program primarily targeted to serve students of color, low-income students and those who are not on track to graduate as a way to help them get back on track.
- Admitted 284 students into the program Recruited 75 employers to participate.
- We are going to reduce the target number to 150 and are talking about a partnership with The Next Move Internship Program.
- Students work 96 hours at minimum wage and they can work as early as beginning of July through the end of August.
- School District staff in the Career Tech Dept and the counselors are in charge of the recruiting of students with disabilities.
- Program is primarily for Tacoma School District. The one exception is through the DVR funding provided by WFC. *LaKesha shared that there has been consistent conversation about extending into Pierce County*.

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Overview of DVR Services Provided to ISY/OSY in Pierce County

Kari gave the following overview of DVR Services:

- DVR Transition Consultant (her role) does not carry case load:
 - Outreach to School Districts and networks with business community
 - o Provides Pre-employment transition consultation to DVR Counselors
 - o Builds relationships with schools
 - Assists School Districts to identify 5-focus areas: Job exploration, workplace readiness training, work based learning, counseling on postsecondary opportunities and self-advocacy
 - o Initiates and monitors contracts with postsecondary schools
- DVR Counselor carries case load of all ages:
 - o Serves as a direct liaison to schools, students and guardians
 - Attends resource fairs
 - Has presence at schools
 - o Community education and awareness
 - Shares success and best practices

- Due to funding issues, DVR is in a federally mandated 'order of selection'. Currently serving the most significantly disabled first.
- When someone applies for services and go through eligibility, they may be found 'most' significantly disabled; significantly disabled or non significantly disabled. What category an individual falls in is not necessarily what the disability is but how the disability affects daily living.
- Open to outreach ideas or feedback on how to better engage schools. Dale suggested a one-page summary of programs and on the back put eligibility requirements so we have an idea of how people can get into the program.

Activities to Increase FAFSA application rate in Pierce County

Kyla Lackie gave a brief update on the work that PSESD has been doing to support financial aid completion in Pierce County:

- With the support of the WorkForce Central and the committee, PSESD has been running a financial aid leadership cohort for the last several months. With this cohort over 50 educators and staff from 21 schools and community, based organizations are coming together.
- Resource that we have shared through the cohort is College Knowledge. College Knowledge booklets were printed for those participating in a cohort and can be downloaded from PSESD website.
- Have mini grants distributed to participants in the cohort to fund new strategies.

Pierce County Career Day

LaKesha shared

- Construction Career Day 2017 was the 10th annual year and was very exciting.
- 2349 from high schools throughout Pierce County and neighboring county preregistered – 2152 students actually attended.
- Every vender and exhibitor that registers for Construction Career Day has to have a **hands on** demonstration.
- The goal of Construction Career Day is to connect high school students to the trades industry. Want to make sure we have viable pipeline of a labor force that can be accessed by our trades' employers from that sector.
- Proposing to create a job fair for seniors who attended Construction Career Day to connect with the same employers that attended as exhibitors – perhaps start having the dialogue of connecting the two for actual job opportunities. Looking at May 2018 for this event.
- Feedback has been very positive.
