Welcome/Introductions	• Dale King called the meeting to order.	
	Roundtable introductions were made.	
Review Prior Meeting Notes	Meeting notes were accepted as prepared.	
Open Doors/Dropout Re-Engagement	 Laurie Shannon, Graduation Specialist, OSPI gave a Powerpoint presentation on the Open Doors Youth Reengagement. Highlights of the presentation: WA State is a first in the nation comprehensive state model. We have an obligation under what was House Bill 1418 to reengage older youth who have left the K12 system without a credential and bring them back and utilize funding to help them do that out of the K12 system. All of this work came out of the Building Bridges recommendations. Case Management is a requirement for all 1418 programs. To be eligible – at least 16 years old on Sept. 1. and less than 21. Students have to meet a credit deficiency ratio although there are designated individuals who can sign a waiver saying this is the best educational placement even if the student doesn't technically meet the credit deficiency ratio. Student stays eligible until they complete. Completion is clearly defined as earning a high school diploma, an associate's degree or having turned 21 before Sept. 1.

	 Comment: Lillian asked that, at some point in the future, perhaps the committee could have a conversation about how to provide some outreach and guidance to those students in non-traditional learning settings. We want them to also be up to date on FAFSA and how they could move forward. 	
Update on Contract to Increase FAFSA application rate in Pierce County	 Update from Kyla: They have kicked off the work around financial aid completion and is excited about building more support for people who are trying to help students through the financial aid process. There is going to be a FAFSA 101 training on September 20th and all are invited to attend. There is the tool kits that was just launched. Also have the tool kit-guidance and strategies. There are four cohorts planned. People will start and go through the process. You need to be part of the cohort in order to apply for funding. She will share the link around College Knowledge when it's ready. 	
	 Over 100 school districts are in the statewide network of reengagement. There are four typical models that operate and some districts utilize multiple versions. Governor's goal is to everyone 44 and under by 2023 with a high school credential of some kind. The State has defined the students who are in Open Doors Youth Reengagement as out of school youth. It has been questioned a couple of times but it has continued to be their standard and can be found in the WIOA manual. <i>She will send this WIOA section to MaryEllen along with today's PowerPoint presentation.</i> Because they are one of the first in the nation they will be hosting the western half of the US in Tacoma for the National League of Cities Reengagement+ on December 6-8 at the Murano.
